HISTORY OF ART

Course Description

This course investigates ancient Greek art, in all its forms, from the Early Bronze Age to the Late Roman period. Lectures, readings, and discussions contextualize the places we visit within the Greek experience and encourage students to make critical connections between civilizations past and present. During this course, students will be exposed to places and people more or less unfamiliar to them. This offers a fantastic opportunity for learning. Travelling with a healthy curiosity will reward students with knowledge and unforgettable experiences.

Goals and Objectives

The main goal is to investigate the different aspects of ancient Greek art (pottery, sculpture, metal work) from the Early Bronze Age down to Late Roman times.

The main objective is to provide students with the necessary tools in order to be able to accurately describe (in the accepted terminology), analyze, and place in chronological and spatial context the artifacts and architectural remains in order to make a synthesis of the material.

Also, students are encouraged to critically examine the intellectual and artistic contributions of the ancient Greeks to modern societies and their relationship to contemporary issues.

Oral Presentation

Each student is required to present one topic from the given list (TBD). The presentations are to take around 15 minutes and students should be prepared to answer questions.

Midterm Paper

Each student is required to submit a research paper on the topic of "Cycladic figurines: typology, function and their influence in modern art". Essays should be about 2,000 words, double spaced and no larger than 12 pt. font. They should be submitted to Dr. Georganas

Final Paper

Each student is required to submit a research paper that delves into a topic relevant to the class (see suggested list of topics below). Essays should be about 2,000 words, double spaced and no larger than 12 pt. font. They should be submitted to Dr. Georganas by All work must be original and properly cited.
